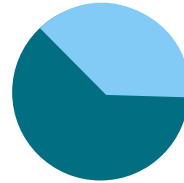

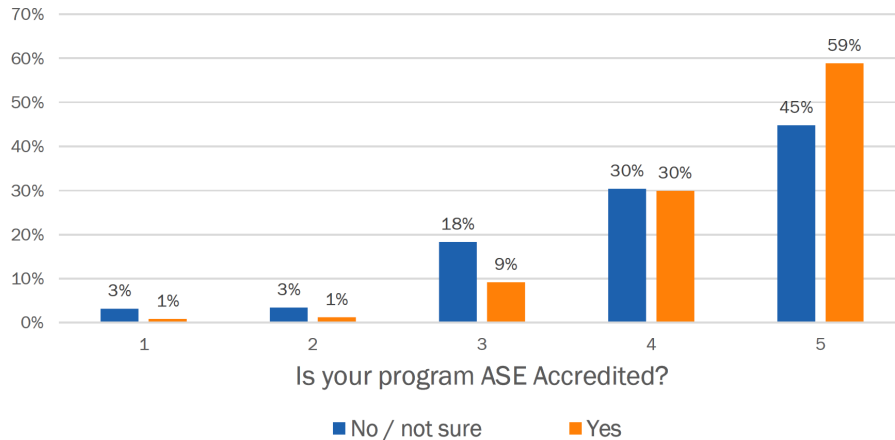

Would students recommend their training program? ASE Accredited vs. Non-Accredited Programs

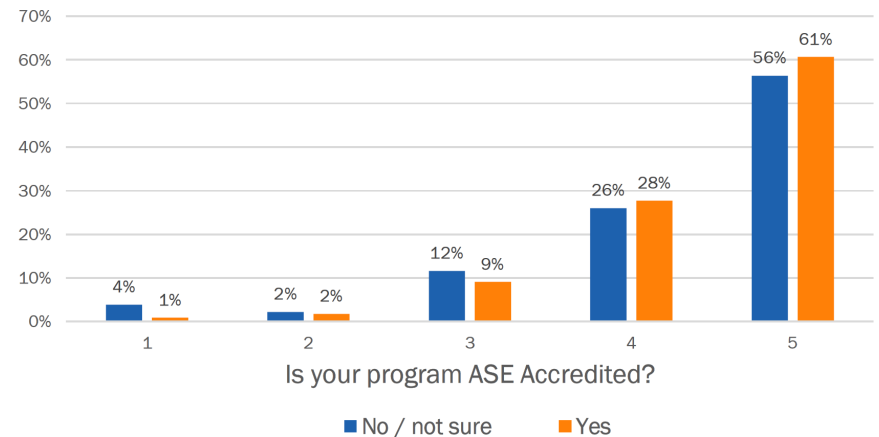
High School

College

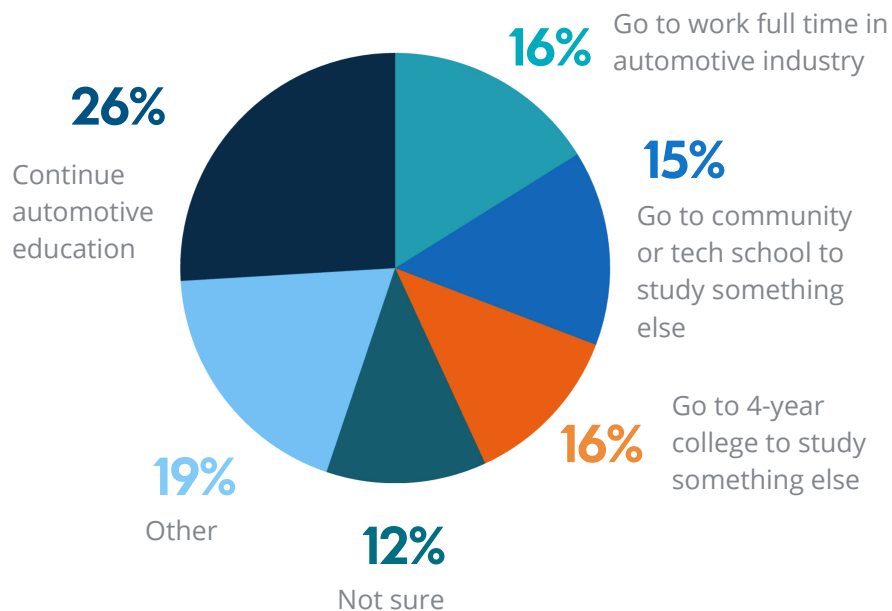
On a scale from 1 to 5, how likely would you be to recommend this training program to a friend?

Plans after graduation for high school seniors:

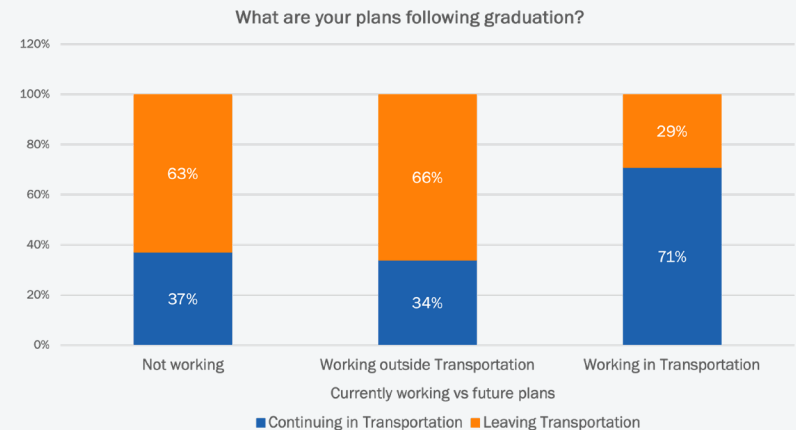


74% of underclassmen plan to continue in their programs next year, but only **42%** of seniors are going to work in our industry or continue their transportation industry studies.



Takeaway: We need more job opportunities for high school students to keep them in the industry

Those continuing in our industry are three different groups:



Just **37%** of those not currently working are staying in the industry, and even worse, only **34%** of those working in something outside our industry are continuing with transportation. Meanwhile **71%** of students that have a job in the industry today plan to stay with us.

Student Competitions


ASE partnered with schools and Auto Dealer Associations in North Texas, Charlotte, Houston, and Salt Lake City to host unique student competitions. New car dealers financially sponsored 123 teams, with total 369 students who participated in these competitions. They performed vehicle diagnostics and multi-point inspections to showcase their skills and win the grand prizes consisting of tools and scholarships. "The goal of the student competition was to connect businesses with schools while increasing the interest of students and encouraging them to stay in the automotive field," said Mike Coley, ASE Education Foundation president.

Goodguys Events

We brought 1,200 students from ASE accredited programs across the nation to 8 Goodguys events in 2025.

"These events showed students how they can have a successful career as a technician and opened their eyes to other industry career paths," says Mike Coley. "Many students have only been exposed to the technician role in the service and repair industry, so sharing a broader view of possible career opportunities and how their automotive coursework applies, opens their eyes to a future of possibilities. Those possibilities are the key to getting and keeping automotive students in our industry."

ASE accredited schools are invited to the hands-on career exploration event, which takes place Fridays prior to select Goodguys events. Students start the day meeting with a panel of experts and top industry professionals. They are then paired with an industry mentor who tours the Goodguys show with them so they can learn what types of careers participating companies have to offer. At the end of the day, students and mentors are given tickets to that weekend's Goodguys event. Students are given an extra ticket to bring a friend, further extending the career day opportunities to more students.

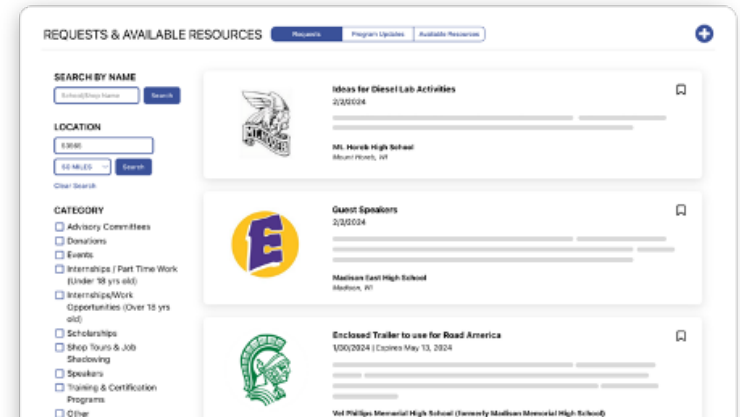


School Assist All-Star Awards Program

Partner Success Story

Dakota's Journey

Dakota Thrasher first got interested in the automotive space working on tractors with his grandfather. These early projects helped shape his path into automotive, which officially began in high school. Hands-on classes in the ASE accredited automotive program at the Frederick County (Maryland) Career & Technology Center (CTC) sparked his interest and set a foundation built on real vehicles, real tools, and real responsibility. While still in high school, he participated in the Maryland Youth Apprenticeship program at Dynamic Automotive in Frederick, balancing school with paid shop experience, working alongside a mentor and following a clear set of goals. After graduation, he doubled down—full-time days at Dynamic, long nights continuing his automotive studies at the Community College of Baltimore County—diving into everything from steering and suspension to engine rebuilds as part of a full registered apprenticeship. That structure and commitment paid off. His performance drew praise from his supervisors, who say graduates of the registered apprenticeship often operate “five years ahead” in their careers.

ASE played a crucial role in Dakota's journey. ASE Entry-Level certification tests gave Dakota an early grasp of the professional testing process, making the jump to professional ASE certifications more seamless. He's already earned two, with more on the way. For Dynamic Automotive, ASE is more than a credential—it's a marker of professionalism and dedication they actively support and incentivize. Backed by ASE-accredited school programs and a disciplined apprenticeship schedule, Dakota isn't just building skills; he's building a reputation for excellence. He wouldn't change a thing about the journey—he's all-in, hungry to learn, and aiming to become a superstar technician.
